NOVEMBER EVENT: VARIETY, THE SPICE OF AGO LIFE

Friday evening, 6 November at 7:00, the Chapter will host an organ recital by Dr. John Schwandt at the Scottish Rite Cathedral, 3633 Lindell Boulevard. Featured will be the Rite's venerable 4-manual, 53-rank Kimball (1924).

Dr. Schwandt is Associate Professor of Organ and Director of the American Organ Institute at the University of Oklahoma School of Music. Nationally acclaimed as a performer, clinician, leader of hymn festivals, silent film accompanist, and organ consultant, he studied at St. Olaf College with John Ferguson, and earned graduate degrees, as well as the prestigious Performer's Certificate, at Indiana University, studying with Larry Palmer. Dr. Schwandt has been a featured performer for the American Guild of Organists, the American Theater Organ Society, and the Organ Historical Society.

In 2006, Schwandt founded the American Organ Institute at the University of Oklahoma. In addition to the traditional performance-based emphases, the AOI is the only program in America which possesses a fully-equipped pipe organ workshop capable of building, maintaining, and restoring instruments. It functions in part as a laboratory for a new curriculum of organ technology courses.

This will certainly be an entertaining evening, with a variety of musical styles being played . . . from Guilmant, Bach, and Grieg, to *The lost chord* and *Tip toe through the tulips*!

I'll see you at the Scottish Rite!

FROM THE DEAN

A co-worker recently remarked, "I've just noticed that so often when people thank me, I respond with a 'yeah,' or 'That's OK.' Too often, I forget to say, 'You're welcome.'" All day we enjoyed the awareness of that specific aspect of civil discourse: the politeness of responding to "thank you" with "you're welcome." What a lift that was for my day!

Professor and author Adam Grant shares some interesting options for taking "You're welcome" to the next level. Grant shares the persuasive power of another unconventional response to "thank you." He quotes author Robert Cialdini's effort to capitalize on the power of that moment with the reply "I know you'd do the same for me."

Grant analyzes the pros and cons of this response in his own experience. Like him, I find the reply unique but ultimately unsatisfactory. The assumed reciprocity is not in keeping with principles of kindness and generosity, rather it implies "strings attached." In the end, Grant adopts and adapts a "pay-it-forward" response: "I know you'll do the same for someone else." A person can be helpful and appreciated without expecting payback. This paradigm shift can actually extend the generosity to a wider network—it seems to be the way we humans are wired.

All this brought me to consider the possibilities we have as a chapter to "pay it forward." How might we "do the same for someone else"?




