OCTOBER AND NOVEMBER: THREE EXCEPTIONAL EVENTS

Monday evening, 6 October at 7:30, world-renowned organist, composer, and teacher Hans Leitner will present a Master Class on the new Martin Ott organ at Peace Lutheran Church. **See Page 11 for "The Details." Refer to Page 5 for the specification of the new instrument.** Since the fall of 2003, Herr Leitner has served as Organist and Cathedral Vicar at the Cathedral of Our Lady of Munich, Germany. From 2003 to 2011 he held a lectureship in liturgy and church music practice at the University of Music and Performing Arts, Munich. Prior to his appointment in Munich, he was Organist of the Cathedral and Vicar to the High St. Stephan Cathedral, Passau, where he also acted as an organ expert of the Diocese of Passau. He is editor of several organ works and author of articles on music history, organ studies, and theological themes. His extensive artistic creativity is documented by numerous CD recordings and television appearances as well as compositions for organ, choir, and brass. Don't miss Herr Leitner's recital at the Cathedral Basilica of St. Louis at 2:30 Sunday afternoon, 5 October.

Monday and Tuesday evening, 20 and 21 October at 7:00, the Second Presbyterian Church (4501 Westminster Place, 63108) in conjunction with our Chapter will host The Reverend Dr. Thomas H. Troeger as the church's 2014 Pfautch Lecturer. Professor Troeger has written twenty books in the fields of preaching, poetry, hymnody and worship. His most recent books include Wonder Reborn: Preaching on Hymns, Music and Poetry; God, You Made All Things for Singing: Hymn Texts, Anthems, and Poems for a New Millennium; So that All Might Know: Preaching that Engages the Whole Congregation (with Edward Everding); Preaching While the Church Is Under Reconstruction; and Above the Moon Earth Rises: Hymn Texts, Anthems and Poems for a New Creation. He is also a flutist and a poet whose work appears in the hymnals of most denominations and is frequently set as choral anthems. Ordained in the Presbyterian Church in 1970 and in the Episcopal Church in 1999, he is dually aligned with both traditions. He served as national chaplain to the American Guild of Organists and is a former president of the Academy of Homiletics (the North American guild of scholars in homiletics) and the immediate past President of Societas Homiletica (the international guild of scholars in homiletics).

Friday evening, 7 November, our Chapter's Regional Convention Committee will host a fundraiser/silent auction/silent movie at the Scottish Rite Auditorium (3633 Lindell Blvd, 63108). The Chapter will sponsor *hors d'oeuvres* beginning at 6:30. Then at 7:30, our own Andy Peters will "have at" the venerable old Kimball whilst Improvising the accompaniment to *Hot Water* starring Harold Lloyd. A donation of \$20 per person is suggested with aficionados 16 years and younger welcomed free.

From the Dean . . .

The best stories and novels include plot with plenty of tension. Throw in some unexpected hardship and a dose of impulsive behavior, and readers are hooked. A good interplay of conflicting elements can leave me wishing I could call out to the characters, "NNNNoooo!...don't do that!"

While tension makes for superb story lines, most of us will go to great lengths to keep tension at a minimum in our lives and in our church positions. Or, where stress and pressure are inevitable, we seek to manage tension well and maintain a healthy balance in general.

Let me include a variety of -"tion"s that I lean on to keep me moving forward.

INSPIRATION

Few things inspire me more than quality organ music. I know some great inspiration awaits when our ears and our senses take in the organ music of Hans Leitner in our home-town treasure, the Cathedral Basilica of Saint Louis. When you buy your ticket for the October 5 recital, mentioning that you are a member of the American Guild of Organists will bring your ticket price to \$12. And I know the inspiration will continue when several of our colleagues play for Herr Leitner's Master Class on the new Ott organ at Peace Lutheran Church on Monday evening, October 6. Please come and let me know what provides you with **inspira-"tion."**

EDUCATION

Wherever I have attended events sponsored by the American Guild of Organists (Wausau, Wisconsin; Dayton, Ohio; here in Saint Louis), it occurs to me that the offerings rank among the finest continuing education I could find. Speakers, recitals, workshops and clinics—they all let me learn from leaders in the field of sacred music. It tickles me pink to meet composers and recitalists and to take home with me fresh songs or ideas to share with my choirs and worshipping assembly.

Another amazing educational event is coming our way on October 20 and 21 when hymn-writer Thomas Troeger will speak at Second Presbyterian Church. I need to hear more from someone who has written texts like "Wind Who Makes All Winds that Blow" and "O Praise the Gracious Power." I look forward to soaking in some wisdom from someone who writes,

"To have the experience of being moved beyond language is essential to claiming our full humanity. Language carries with it the dangerous illusion that we can control reality through what we say and write, that if we can just find the perfect words, we will catch in our language the reality we have encountered . . . the church has long had a 'theology of the Word,' . . . but we need as well a theology of sighing, a theology of sound . . . sound is more primordial than language, it is what first reaches the heart." (from *Wonder Reborn* by Thomas Troeger, p. 88)

I am proud that our local AGO Chapter is co-sponsoring Dr. Troeger's lectures along with Second Presbyterian Church, and providing some great ongoing educa-"tion."

COLLABORATION

We can all tell stories about how assumptions and gaps in our planning or communication contributed to regrettable moments. Let's take time to remember when working together and staying in touch made something happen that no one of us could have accomplished alone. Each of you has something important to contribute to our organization. Your presence and **collabora-"tion"** bring us to places at which we could never arrive unless we have YOU on board. Your contribution builds us into a stronger Guild.

RECREATION

More about this in the next OPUS, when we get geared up for the November 7 Convention Fund-raiser. Trust me! You won't want to miss this great evening!

Like a well-crafted novel, an excellent piece of music draws my senses and my heart into the tension of the work. I can't help but await the resolution into rich harmonies, into a satisfying ending. Our deep desire is that the music we share brings meaning to the lives of others and eases their tensions, brings them some resolution. What important work is ours as we carry on, with **dedica-"tion."**





NUNC DIMITTIS—FORMER CHAPTER COLLEAGUES:






