From the St. Louis Chapter Dean...

On the Subject of Digital Technology

Last month our chapter presented a program on MIDI and digital organ technology. Judging by the attendance, there is lively interest in this subject. I was pleased to make the acquaintance of some delightful people at that event, including several who are not AGO members. One person told me, in effect, that he was not a member because the Guild only seems to recognize pipe organs and those who play them. Naturally, I was sorry to hear him say that, but his remarks were not surprising, and I am prompted to attempt a constructive response.

I suggest that the great "divide" between those who play pipe organs and digital organs is largely illusory. Most of us keyboard players, in the course of our careers, are called upon to make effective music on instruments of variable type, character, and quality. And unlike the violinist, whose instrument is almost an extension of his body, the organist is remarkably unattached, like an itinerant frontier pedagogue in search of a schoolhouse. All of us at one time or another have had to make the best of a ciphering electropneumatic, or an old Hammond with a single octave pedal-board, to say nothing of out-of-tune spinet pianos with broken keys.

I think it is fair to say that the pipe organ remains the archetype for digital instruments. For decades, electronic models have imitated pipe organ nomenclature, principles of voicing, and console design, and newer versions feature sampled sounds from historic instruments. Hence, our coming summer education institute is called "Pipe Organ

Encounter," not to exclude digital organs, but to acknowledge the historic prototype of ecclesiastical instruments.

Every organist, even the most traditional, enjoys the benefits of technology, if only to dispense with manually operated bellows. Many of the ingenious advances in solid-state and digital technology have proven immensely helpful, and we would do well to consider new developments with open minds. Nonetheless, at some point we are compelled to raise some incisive questions. I will not presume to give definitive answers, and each reader may very well arrive at different conclusions than mine. Still, it is in our interest to ask the questions and think carefully about the implications of our answers.

Is music in worship ancillary or atmospheric, or can it be in itself a worshipful expression? Can the playing of an instrumental solo be construed as an act of worship? To what extent is it necessary that music in communal worship be "live?"

One impressive technological development is the "sequencer." Available on pipe and digital instruments, this device enables the "recording" of one's own playing, permitting the instrument to replicate that performance. To what extent does the use of sequencer playback in worship constitute "live music?" How does such use of the sequencer differ from the prerecorded accompaniment tapes offered by many choral publishers, or other recorded music?

Is the use of a digitally sampled



instrumental sound a suitable substitute for engaging an instrumental soloist? Would it be valid to substitute digitally sampled sounds for, say, a handbell ensemble? To what extent is this likely to broaden or narrow the scope of church music ministry?

The artistic use of illusion is a vital creative technique, such as we hear in the suggestive art of the organ transcription. Likewise, the distinctive character and beauty of the "orchestral organ" arises from its imitation rather than replication of orchestral sounds. What is the impact of "virtual reality," with accurate, digitally sampled sounds, on musical imagination and genuine artistic inventiveness?

Those are my questions; you fill in the answers. Ultimately, whatever our view of digital organ technology, we should be deeply concerned about how we use it, because the discussion is about more than the purely aesthetic.






