MARY HITCHCOCK-REINHART

Mary Hitchcock-Reinhart is a music therapist at Ranken Jordan Pediatric Bridge Hospital. Mary has degrees in Music Education, Church Music, and Music Therapy from Texas Christian University, Scarritt Graduate School, and Maryville University respectively. Mary's organ teachers have included Emmet Smith and Wilma Jensen. Originally from Maryland, Mary was an Orioles fan growing up but now cheers on the Cardinals and TCU Horned Frogs. Mary and husband Ted have two grown daughters, and will have a son-in-law as of June 8. Formerly, Mary was organist and director of traditional worship at Salem UMC and now substitutes on organ benches in the area.

Earl Naylor is organist and director of music for the First Unitarian Universalist Church of St. Louis and Temple Emanuel Reform Jewish Congregation in St. Louis County. A Past Dean of the St. Louis Chapter of the American Guild of Organists, Mr. Naylor was also chairman of the Organ Historical Society National Convention when it was held in St. Louis.

SPENCER SMITH

Spencer Smith has been the Minister of Music at Second Presbyterian Church in St. Louis since July 2022. At Second Church, Spencer directs adult choir, Second Church Chorale and handbell choir, and leads worship from both the organ and the piano. In addition to worship, he also directs the Couts Music Series, which includes programs in various genres of music. Outside of his duties at Second Church, Spencer is also a tenor, pianist, and conductor. As a singer he is a full member of the St. Louis Chamber Chorus, and participates in projects with the South Dakota based choral ensemble Transept. As a collaborative pianist, Spencer has accompanied a



variety of different ensembles including choirs, soloists, chamber music ensembles, and choral workshops throughout Eastern South Dakota and Northwestern Iowa at the high school and collegiate level. Smith is a member of area organizations including the American Guild of Organists. Spencer was previously the Director of Music & Arts Ministry at First Congregational Church in Sioux Falls, SD.

In May 2020, Spencer received a Master's Degree in Music with a specialization in Conducting, studying under Dr. David Holdhusen and Dr. Timothy Campbell at the University of South Dakota. Smith received a Bachelor's degree in Piano Performance from the University of South Dakota in the spring of 2017 where he studied piano with Dr. Susanne Skyrm and collaborative piano and chamber music with Dr. Susan Keith Gray. He studied organ under the direction of Dr. Larry Schou.

2026 National Convention

AVIS BLEWETT AWARD

ST. LOUIS AGO CHAPTER



The Avis H. Blewett Award may be given annually to a person who meets the qualifications set forth under the guidelines given below. The Award process will include approval of the recipient at the March Executive Committee meeting and presentation of the Award at the annual meeting.

Guidelines:

The nominee should have made a significant contribution to the field of sacred music in the metropolitan Saint Louis area. Nominees may include church/synagogue/temple musicians, teachers, composers, or others. (Sacred music is defined as music that falls within the charter of the American Guild of Organists.)

The awardee will receive an inscribed plaque or framed certificate. Guild Members will receive one year National AGO and Saint Louis Chapter membership. Non Guild members will receive a one-year subscription to The American Organist Magazine, and a one-year subscription to The OPUS. The format of the award may vary, as appropriate. A record shall be kept of the awardees and the status of their awards.

Nominations are to be submitted by **March 1** to a member of the Avis H. Blewett Award Committee (appointed by the Dean and listed below.) This Committee will select and recommend the awardee(s), if any.

The Executive Committee will approve or reject the proposed awardee(s) at its March 18, 2024 meeting.

The award may be presented at the annual meeting. Current and past Avis Blewett Award recipients will be invited to the annual meeting as guests of the Chapter and their individual dinners will be provided at Chapter expense.







In addition to repertoire and helpful resources, participants will be introduced to three trailblazing women composers:


Dr. Lynn Loewi will discuss British organist and composer Elizabeth Stirling (1819-1895), who was profiled in the January issue of *The American Organist.*

Jim Germann shares his article from Reed Organ Society Newsletter:

I recently visited a pipe organ builder in Victoria, Texas who contacted the Reed Organ Society about liquidating his collection of organs, tools, and supplies. The builder is Russell Franklin whose shop and warehouse is actually near Inez, Texas which is on the gulf coast about halfway between Corpus Christi and Houston.

Mr. Franklin is a delightful gentleman who has been installing and repairing pipe organs in South Texas since 1986. He has an encyclopedic knowledge of area organs and churches and loves to reminisce about his work over the years. Sadly, recent health challenges have necessitated the closing of his business. His website is still up and running and can be viewed at <u>www.franklinpipeorgans.com</u>.

Along the way, he has also restored many reed organs as well, and is a past member of the Reed Organ Society.

The liquidation of his business is a significant undertaking given that the business occupies several thousand square feet of warehouse space that is full-to-overflowing with instruments, tools, books, and supplies. It is estimated that about 75% of the items for liquidation are pipe organs and pipe organ related items, but Mr. Franklin has at least a dozen reed organs along with reed organ tools and supplies such as glue pots, bellows cloth, reed hooks, books on organ repair, blowers, organ benches and stools, and the like.


The pipe organs and supplies are currently being advertised in *The Diapason* and on the pipe organ clearinghouse website, but Mr. Franklin also wants to ensure that Reed Organ Society members are aware of all the reed organs/supplies that are available.

Time is of the essence given that Mr. Franklin must vacate his place of business by about June 1, 2024. Given that he is retiring, he would certainly accept a nominal amount for any of the items, but he mostly wishes to see the organs and supplies go to good homes rather than being taken to the dump. (I think he would give many items, including organs, away for free...)
