February Flourish Hit All the Right Notes

February Flourish was attended by over 60 church musicians in its two parts: the Hymn Festival and the Workshops on February 16 and 17 at Kirkwood Baptist Church. The majority of attendees were members of the St. Louis Chapter of the AGO.

Attendees of the February Flourish event shared a range of positive comments about their experiences. Many appreciated Dr. Burkhardt's insights on encouraging congregational singing, including his warm-up routines and choral techniques prior to the reading session. His lecture and materials on effective hymn playing were particularly valuable, offering practical tips on hymn interpretation, creative hymn accompaniment, and techniques to engage the congregation. Several attendees found his discussion of new organ repertoire enriching, with some even purchasing music based on his recommendations, such as the "Toccatas for Organ" by Michael Burkhardt. Others noted the inspiration they gained in planning and leading worship, with renewed motivation to practice the organ and refine their choral directing skills. The workshops provided practical takeaways for working with singers, including breathing techniques, warm-ups, and dynamics. The Hymn Festival was a highlight, showcasing innovative approaches to hymn playing and choral performance. While one attendee mentioned difficulty hearing Dr. Burkhardt at times, they still found the experience deeply enjoyable, particularly the final choral piece. Overall, the event provided valuable insights, new musical selections, and inspiration for both active and retired musicians.

Attendees of February Flourish offered several suggestions for improving the event. Many emphasized the need for a microphone, as some had difficulty hearing Dr. Burkhardt, especially those seated in the back or with hearing aids. Providing time for questions and assessing participants' musicianship levels and backgrounds were also recommended. Some attendees suggested starting the event earlier in the day or moving it to the summer to avoid driving home in the dark. Others expressed interest in more content on handbells and practical guidance on joining professional organizations such as AGO, NPM, and the HAGSTL. A stronger focus on congregational repertoire rather than performance-based pieces was also encouraged. Some attendees appreciated the opportunity to purchase music and felt the event was well organized overall. Adjustments to the schedule, such as finishing earlier in the day and including a meal, were also proposed to better accommodate winter travel concerns.

Many thanks to the February Flourish Committee, especially to Rick Burk, who stepped up to help with the Eventbrite registration, and Mike Kaberline, who provided the financial expertise for the budgeting and registration process.

A special thank you to Mark Lawson, who made all the arrangements for Michael Burkhardt and secured First Baptist Church of Kirkwood for the event.

Gay is the organist/choirmaster at the Episcopal Parish of Alton in Illinois. She holds a Master's degree in Organ Performance from Webster University in St. Louis, Missouri and a Bachelor of Music Education degree with an emphasis in Piano Performance from Greenville College (now Greenville University) in Greenville, Illinois. She studied private organ with Canon Precentor William Partridge (retired) at Christ Church Cathedral in St. Louis for 10 years. Private piano professors included Renato Premezzi (retired from Beloit College in Wisconsin), Dr. Richard Strassberg (Ohio Wesleyan in Delaware, Ohio) and Marion Lampe (retired from Southern Illinois University in Edwardsville). Gay is active in the St. Louis Chapter of the American Guild of Organists, currently serving as



Chapter secretary. She is married to attorney Roy Anderson. They have been blessed with two children: son, David (organist/music director St. Peter's UCC in Ferguson, Missouri) and daughter Lauren (3 D graphic artist in Carey, North Carolina). Gay is also an Equestrian instructor at the family–owned dressage and hunter/ jumper stable Brier Bank Farm and operates Livery Haus Music studio, both located in Marine, Illinois. JOSEPH ARNDT

Joseph Arndt began as Organist and Director of Music at The Church of St. Michael & St. George in August 2024. At CSMSG he is leading the campaign for a new chancel organ, Opus 188 by Schoenstein & Co., to be installed in 2026. He directs a traditional Anglican music program including twice-monthly Choral Evensong and a renewed Choristers program for children and youth.

Before coming to St. Louis, he was Director of Music at St. John's Episcopal Church in Tulsa, where he led the campaign for the 2018 chancel organ, Opus 173 by Schoenstein & Co. His work in Tulsa included the founding of the Oklahoma Bach Choir, an ensemble dedicated to performing the sacred works of Johann Sebastian Bach with period instruments. He conducted a *Leipzig 300* series commemorating the 300th anniversary of Bach's appointment as Thomaskantor in Leipzig. This series included a lecture by author and Bach scholar Christoph Wolff. Prior to ten years in Tulsa, he was an assisting organist and continuo player at Trinity Wall Street and Bach Vespers at Holy Trinity in New York City.



A graduate of The Juilliard School (MM) and Westminster Choir College (BM), he is a former organ student of Paul Jacobs, Ken Cowan, and Diane Meredith Belcher. To celebrate the bicentennial of César Franck, he performed the composer's organ works with a tour including performances in Houston, Fort Worth, New York City, Seattle, Denver, and Tulsa. He has commissioned new organ works, most recently *Paean* by Rebecca Groom te Velde, published in 2023 by Oxford University Press.

Mr. Arndt has served the AGO throughout his career. He is a past Dean of the Tulsa Chapter and served as Fundraising Chair of the 2023 Southwest Regional Convention.



PHILLIP BRUNSWICK

Phillip has served Grace Episcopal Church - Kirkwood as Organist & Choir Master since 1992. During his tenure he has successfully developed choirs for children in *The Royal School of Church Music* tradition. In 1998 he founded the first RSCM Training Course west of the Mississippi and was the Executive Director for 15 years.

Brunswick is a native of Kirkwood, Missouri, and holds a Performance Certificate from the St. Louis Conservatory and School of the Arts. In addition, he is a graduate from Fontbonne University with a BM in Organ Performance.

In addition to his work at the parish, he has held many leadership roles with The American Guild of Organists – St. Louis and The Royal School of Church Music – America.

LUELLA FOSTER

Luella Foster has been immersed in music since birth. In high school, she played piano and baritone horn with her two trumpet brothers and continued the family tradition of accompanying and singing in choirs. Practice was as important as STEM homework.

At the University of Vermont, Luella concentrated in medical technology while summers on Cape Cod were where she was captivated by organ with Brian Jones. Upon graduation, lab work was accompanied with organ subbing and studies with Harriet Slack Richardson.

In the Peace Corps in West Africa, Luella was exposed to exciting drums, dance, acapella singing and patch percussion. It was three years of post graduation!!!

Upon returning to lab work in DC, Luella joined a worship praise band in the 70's. Charles Wesley Proctor joined with his banjo and theological expertise. Eventually he wooed her to Kirkwood UMC and classical choir and bells. Joy came; four years later, we adopted siblings Mindy and Jeremy. This brought discovery in the effectiveness of Vivaldi's Four Seasons and the calming effect of baroque music. Luella graduated in music ed K-12 from Meramec, STLCC with Robert Howard, then continued studies in church music at Webster U with Pat Partridge.

This led to organ, bell, and choir leadership, at Union UMC, St. Louis, 2001 to 2017. Currently, Luella loves being organist, bell and choir director at Carondelet UCC. She is looking forward to sharing experiences with the St. Louis AGO.

MATTHEW GERHARDT

Matthew Gerhardt serves as Kantor (music director) at St. Paul's Lutheran in Des Peres, MO. Previously, Matt was Assistant Organist and Choir Director at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Indianapolis, IN. He received his Master of Music degree in Organ Performance from the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music in the organ studio of Dr. Janette Fishell. During his time at IU, he studied improvisation with Bruce Neswick and Robert Nicholls. Matt received his Bachelor's degree in Parish (Sacred) Music from Concordia University Wisconsin, where he studied organ with Dr. John Behnke. Following his time at Concordia, Matt spent a year enrolled as a guest student at the Hochschule für Kirchenmusik in Herford, Germany. In Germany he studied organ and improvisation with Stefan Kagl and received the top score of 1,0 (excellent) on the MA-level organ performance exam.

The original stenciled design of this Jackson tracker organ was hidden under a layer of flaking, yellow varnish.

The pipes were stripped to bare metal, repainted and hand stenciled using copies of the original decorative patterns.



Repairs were made to all of the pipes, and new tuning slides were fabricated.



The organ was pitched to A=440, and given a thorough revoicing to achieve a more cohesive sound.

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Using Canva for Graphics

As organists, we often need to create a flyer or social media post to advertise an event. One option for making more professional looking graphics is an online app, called Canva.

The St. Louis Public Library is offering classes on Creating a Flyer with Canva. Canva has both free and paid versions available. This may be useful to your organization for advertising upcoming events.

Here is the information from <u>slpl.org</u>: "Join us for a fun introduction to Canva! Perfect for beginners, this class will help you create stunning graphics for social media, presentations, and more.
